Our Beach House

Who would ever guess that Benton Beach House, in the parking lot of Benton Beach, is over 70 years old? By every account told by the sons and daughters of the late Eliot H. Benton, patriarch of Sachem's Farm, it is an old farm outbuilding. Originally, it stood in the west yard of the Benton farmhouse, against a ledge that can still be seen. It was moved to the beach premises to serve beach-goers.

This rudimentary structure has a wonderful life of its own. As a beach house for 34 years, it serves a variety of needs: as a bath house, convenient storage place and emergency retreat during summer squalls. Its bare wood walls have a Victorian flavor with wondrous warm smells of drying bathing suits, inner tubes, and other mildewy artifacts that belong on the seashore. Moreover, the sundry wasp nests on every rafter make a visit to the beach house an adventure by itself. On the exterior, the beach house has all the trappings of a little cottage, accented by the white trim boards, geranium box, hanging buoys, and curling cedar shingles.

Marjorie Benton Spalding, the eldest of the six Benton children, remembers when the Beach House served in the 1920s as a storage shed for the family's horse-drawn double-seated carriage. She remembers one memorable occasion when her mother drove the buggy through muddy roads to visit Grandma Norton in Leete's Island.

Attached to the carriage house was a little addition with its own entry door that was formerly Herbert Benton's blacksmith shop. Herbert Benton (1843 - 1929) was the son of Eliot Benton and both father and son used this shop during their lifetimes. It contained a forge, anvil, bellows, and a full line of smithing tools.

By the 1930s, after the carriage "buggy" had outlived its usefulness, the building was converted to the children's playhouse. One of Carolyn Benton Helander's earliest childhood memories is playing with dolls here.

The journey of the carriage house/playhouse to Benton Beach occurred in the year 1964, when it was carefully dismantled and re-erected at the beach. Grandpa Benton's daybook for the year 1964 chronicles the recycling of this little building, beginning with a town building permit taken out on July 7:

- July 14: Dorothy and I worked out the beach, building cement piers for the bathhouse.
- July 18: Elton and Joel came down and we pulled the playhouse down.
- July 20: Dorothy, Bob, and Curtis came down at 7 p.m. and we put up the two sides of the bathhouse.
- July 21: Worked at the bathhouse. Bob and Dos came.
- July 22: Worked on the bathhouse. Bob and Dos came and put up the rafters.

Nearly every day until August 11, 1964, when the job was finished, Grandpa Benton's entries reflect continuous work on the new bathhouse.


Dear Aunt Dorothy Benton Perkins (1918 - 1970) was truly the spirit and force behind our Beach House. This should not be forgotten. It was Dorothy who initiated the project and performed much of the hard manual labor with her husband and father. Finally, she had the vision to put up the geranium box and plant two spruce trees.

Long live Benton beach House! In appreciating its antiquity, can anybody find the carved date "1929" in its north siding?
