

The only exception was the pre-work weekend staged by the Ott team, David and Peter, who delivered 20 tons of 3/4 inch traprock for a dressing on the Beach Road, May 7. They were assisted by Malcolm Hill. This was a noble boost because the Beach Road has had no traprock maintenance since 1992.

Through brute strength, Forrest and Eliot laid the docktops. One section, which had been washed away in a winter storm, was later replaced by J. Helander, using the new ACQ lumber (non-arsenic), which is now used for beach projects. The carpentry crew of Kathryn, Eliot, and Forrest skillfully fabricated the extension of the handrail for the re-built dock, plus an elegant bench on the eastern "T" of the dock.

Eight yards of rich loam were spread and seeded by Tim, Donna, Wendy, Juan-Victor,, Andrew, Sandra, Ellen, et al. Ellen and daughter Kate installed the shade canopy, which has been mended and reinforced. Sharon patiently

prepped and stained two picnic tables. Daniel raked and prepared the fire pit. Heather and Andrew raked the beach. Joel cleared brush along the stonewall in the parking area. Lynne dutifully vacuumed the beach house. Roger's green thumb arranged the geranium flowerbox and flower beds.

In early afternoon, we were treated to the rare and resplendent sight of the three-masted Barque Eagle, sailing westward. Kate and Andrew made the pizza run, supplying a stack of hot pies for hungry troops, generously provided by E.B.F., in addition to Sandra's famous punch and the Fales' gourmet cookies.

Acting on concerns by our neighbors on Beauty Mountain, plus other reports of comings & goings at the beach at odd hours of the day, the Board of BBC is taking remedial steps to effect better security. This is not a new issue, nor is it out-of-control, but simply needs to be monitored.

Kayak landing parties have been one of the newest security issues. Kayakers have created a genuine problem on the Thimble Islands, year round, reportedly with breaking and entering of buildings. The old issue of Indian Cove residents using the Beach Road on a regular basis will be addressed with new signage along the road. A new cedar pole gate with a clip cable will be installed a little south of the old gate, to be instituted in the off-season. Please don't hesitate to report suspicious activity or to inquire discreetly about unknown beach users. Since a number of non-family members have beach rights, we need to exercise care and courtesy in making inquiries, but ultimately we protect our interests by doing so.
