

The Eliot Line-up

Eight living members of the extended Benton family carry the name of "Eliot" in their names. This is, of course, no accident. It is a calculated remembrance of our Eliot pedigree, beginning with Eliot H. Benton (1889-1981) of Sachem's Head, whose mother was Fannie Mariah Eliot (Benton).

Fanny Mariah Eliot lived on the site of the former Guilford movie theatre at the southwest corner of Guilford Green. She, in turn, was the direct lineal descendant of the Reverend Joseph Eliot who came to Guilford from Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1664 to serve as minister of the First Congregational Church. Before Reverend Eliot's settlement in Guilford, this town experienced great unrest and turmoil in the church, prompted largely by the return of many of Guilford's founding fathers to England after the monarchy had been crushed.

The Reverend Joseph Eliot was born in Roxbury, Massachusetts, the son of the celebrated Reverend John Eliot (1604-1690), who earned the exalted title of "Apostle to the Indians." The elder Eliot was minister in Roxbury and passed a career in Christianizing the Native Americans. His translation of the Holy Bible into the Native American language, "Up Biblum God," is a treasure. Yale Beinecke Library (New Haven, CT) owns several copies.

We who carry the Eliot name do so with pride and reverence. The line-up is:
